# Message from George:

## The 3 I's of Meaningful Membership:

For almost 10 years, I have connected people who would not have had the opportunity to meet on their own. One person would have an intellectual or developmental disability, and the other person would come from the center of our community. One person would be called the protege, and the other would be called the advocate. For years, advocates and proteges have shared learned wisdom from their relationships. They have thought about ways to help develop Meaningful Membership for their protégé.

If you Google the term Meaningful Membership, there will be links and articles that share the benefits of people having membership in their communities, moreover, how much more powerful membership is when it is meaningful. Often, within our community, people with disability labels are placed with other people with disabilities. When they seek membership in non- "special" programs (or programs only for people with disabilities), they are either turned away, treated like children, or used as token members.

Advocates know that when their protege is valued as a member, it enhances the organization, helps build competencies for all involved, and helps Chatham County become the definition of "community." Advocates have used their one-to-one relationships to help their proteges seek out Meaningful Membership. Here are a few learning points they have shared with me.

**Introducer:** Advocates have chosen to be the introducer for their protege. One advocate helped introduce her protege to his neighbors. She took notice of some of the items on the neighbors' porches such as plants, door decorations, etc. She used what she saw to start a conversation, and then she introduced her protege. After a while, the protege and neighbor started conversing without the advocate.

Another advocate identified who was the longest-living neighbor in the neighborhood. This neighbor had community value and was considered the wise woman on the block. She introduced herself and later introduced her protege. The block-wise woman and the protege started sitting on the porch together and conversing regularly.

In the first situation, the advocate used the power of introduction to help her protege be seen as someone with common interests as his neighbor. Because of that, the protege was viewed as a neighbor and could explore shared interests with his neighbors.

In the second example, the advocate identified one of the most valued neighbors on the block and introduced her protege to that neighbor. The protege was able to share her neighbor's community capital, resulting in a higher standing in her community.

**Inviter:** In both situations, the advocates used the power of introduction to help their proteges develop meaningful membership in their neighborhood. Inviter: Advocates have also taken on the inviter role to help their proteges develop meaningful membership. First, advocates get to know the interests and likes of their protege and then look within their circles (work friends, church, civic clubs, family, etc.) to decide who to invite to meet their protege. Advocates who have chosen this role make sure the protege and the person they are inviting have a shared like or commonality. And often, this commonality was tied to membership. For example, both people like sports and the inviter is a member of a sports club. Next, when the advocate shares the invitation, they lead with information about the gifts of their protege. Lastly, the advocate makes sure that the first time the two people meet, they are in a place that is comfortable for their protege.

# Through the power of invitation, advocates have used their circles, connections, and the gifts of the protege to possibly open doors of meaningful membership.

**Identifier:** Advocates have chosen to get to know their protege well, identify their interests, and identify places, associations, and groups that align with the protege's interests.

Places are often identified close to the protege's home, where people tend to find meaningful communal membership. Some places have been barbershops or beauty salons, community coffee shops and restaurants, and parks where people tend to meet and connect.

Associations are typical membership organizations. The advocate starts with the question: "What is everyone else my protege's age doing to build membership?" That question can lead the advocate to associations. For example, if the protege is between 25 and 39, the advocate may help the protege find membership in the Jaycees (a club for young professionals). If the protege is interested in gardening, the advocate may help the protege become a member of the local gardening club.

Groups are informal membership organizations. In the search for groups, advocates start with a similar question: "What is everyone else who shares the same interest as my protege doing to build membership?" If the protege enjoys poetry, where are the spoken word groups? The biggest difference between groups and associations is that groups do not have a formal membership process.

After the advocate uses the power of identification, they often become an introducer to help facilitate the membership process.

In the roles of Identifier, Inviter, and Introducer, advocates have shared wisdom that we all could use to start building meaningful relationships in Chatham County.

## A Few Stories

**Advocate Linda Wittish** first said yes to getting to know Charlene in 1980. Within 44 years, Linda saw Charlene get married and move from place to place. The two women supported each other through the loss of loved ones, few health scares, and celebrated birthdays and grandchildren together.

Recently, Linda noted that Charlene has been her friend longer than anyone else.

**Advocate Fred Scott-Fields** and Mr. Harmon have known each other for nine years. Fred says that he sees himself as Mr. Harmon's good nephew. The two guys have been fishing together and have always enjoyed spending time with one another. Mr. Harmon has met Fred's frat brothers, and Fred has had conversations with Mr. Harmon's family. As Mr. Harmon approaches his mid-70s, Fred notices that his memory is not what it used to be and is figuring out how to support him best. He met with Mr. Harmon's new group home staff and helped them become aware of some of the things that Mr. Harmon likes and dislikes. He recognizes that Mr. Harmon is moving at a slower pace and is putting thought into the next stage of Mr. Harmon's life.



Fred is letting Mr. Harmon know that no matter what comes next, he is willing to be an ally and someone who will continue to stand with him through the good and bad times.

Advocate Erika Morrow and Ginger have known each other for 10 months. The two women have gone to the movies together, eaten pizza, hung out with cool pilots, celebrated Christmas, and Thanksgiving together, and visited parks and fun places throughout town; Ginger has met Erika's husband, and Erika has met Ginger's family. Erika's connection to Ginger has helped her explore new parts of town and she has had the joy of connecting Ginger to people within her personal circle.



The two women have shown that the way to build a relationship is to find shared interests, celebrate together, and get to know each other's family. They have found the beauty in spending time together vs. doing an activity.

**Advocate Wanda Jackson and Penny** first met five months ago. The two women often discuss their favorite recipes, songs, and dance moves. Wanda recently has been helping Penny navigate through mold issues at her apartment complex. Wanda is also concerned about Penny's health and any connection to mold.

Wanda and Penny's relationship is new, but the two women have found commonality in their lives and are working on shared concerns.


